1. Election of new members	Two new members were elected. Angela Morgan: proposed by Jane Clarke and seconded by Wesley Wright Graham Sharp: proposed by Paul Lafferty and seconded by Wesley Wright	
2. Police Report	There have 45 been crimes reported since the last DCC meeting: 13 have been detected and 32 are either ongoing or closed. There were 8 shoplifting incidents, 2 assaults, 5 cases of fraud, 5 road traffic accidents, 2 bike thefts, 1 drugs crime and 1 incidence of housebreaking. There is a marked reduction in bike theft and housebreaking.	
3. Elected Members' updates	There were no elected members present so no updates.	
4. Previous Minutes	With some minor alterations, the minutes were approved	
5. Matters Arising	Post Office: John Mason has received a reply from the Post Office which states that they are still working through interest they have received with regard to the Duke Street franchise; as this is confidential information they cannot comment	

	<p>further. The proposal for relocation will go out for consultation though there is no deadline stated in the letter. It was pointed out that DCC will not necessarily get notification of this consultation so members should keep an eye out for this through other sources.</p> <p>100 Finlay Drive: no decision was taken on 8th December. There have been 67 objections lodged. Transport Planning Comments on the portal have recommended refusal on the basis that parking provision is inadequate. The decision is still pending.</p>	
<p>6. HMOs – do we still want to automatically object to them?</p>	<p>In 2011, Dennistoun Conservation Society did some work which indicated that the percentage of HMOs in the Conservation area was about 10% of total dwellings. On the basis that this was probably the case across Dennistoun as a whole and that 10% is an acceptable limit, DCC took the decision in September 2011 to automatically object to new HMOs thus ensuring that the 10% limit was maintained. As far as existing HMOs reapplying for a licence, each case will be viewed on its own merits.</p> <p>After some discussion, it was agreed that the status quo would apply until we have statistics about HMOs in the area. It was suggested that local Councillors are best placed to find this information.</p>	
<p>7 Chair’s Project</p>	<p>Information was circulated prior to the meeting. Some minor changes were suggested. Subject to these, the induction pack was approved. It was suggested that a single page version of the induction pack would be useful for members of the public with perhaps copies being available at DCC meetings. It was pointed out that the DCC members contact list is a confidential document for DCC members only and should not be shared with others. Any contact information on it should not be passed on without the permission of the member concerned.</p>	<p>Chair to make agreed changes.</p>

8. Public Input	<p>Pip Lawrenson explained the work of the MacMillan @Glasgowlibraries service. In Dennistoun Library. This service is staffed by trained volunteers who support people affected by cancer, including friends and relatives of those diagnosed. As well as the support service, they also have counseling and complementary therapies provided by Cancer Support Scotland.</p> <p>They do take referrals but mainly adopt a drop-in approach.</p> <p>The rooms they occupy in the library can be used by other groups when they are not using them themselves.</p> <p>They are also keen to do outreach work such as stands at events etc.</p> <p>Wesley agreed to refresh the information on the DCC website.</p> <p>Dennistoun Diggers invited MacMillan to signpost people who may be interested to their project.</p>	Wesley to refresh MacMillan information in the DCC website
